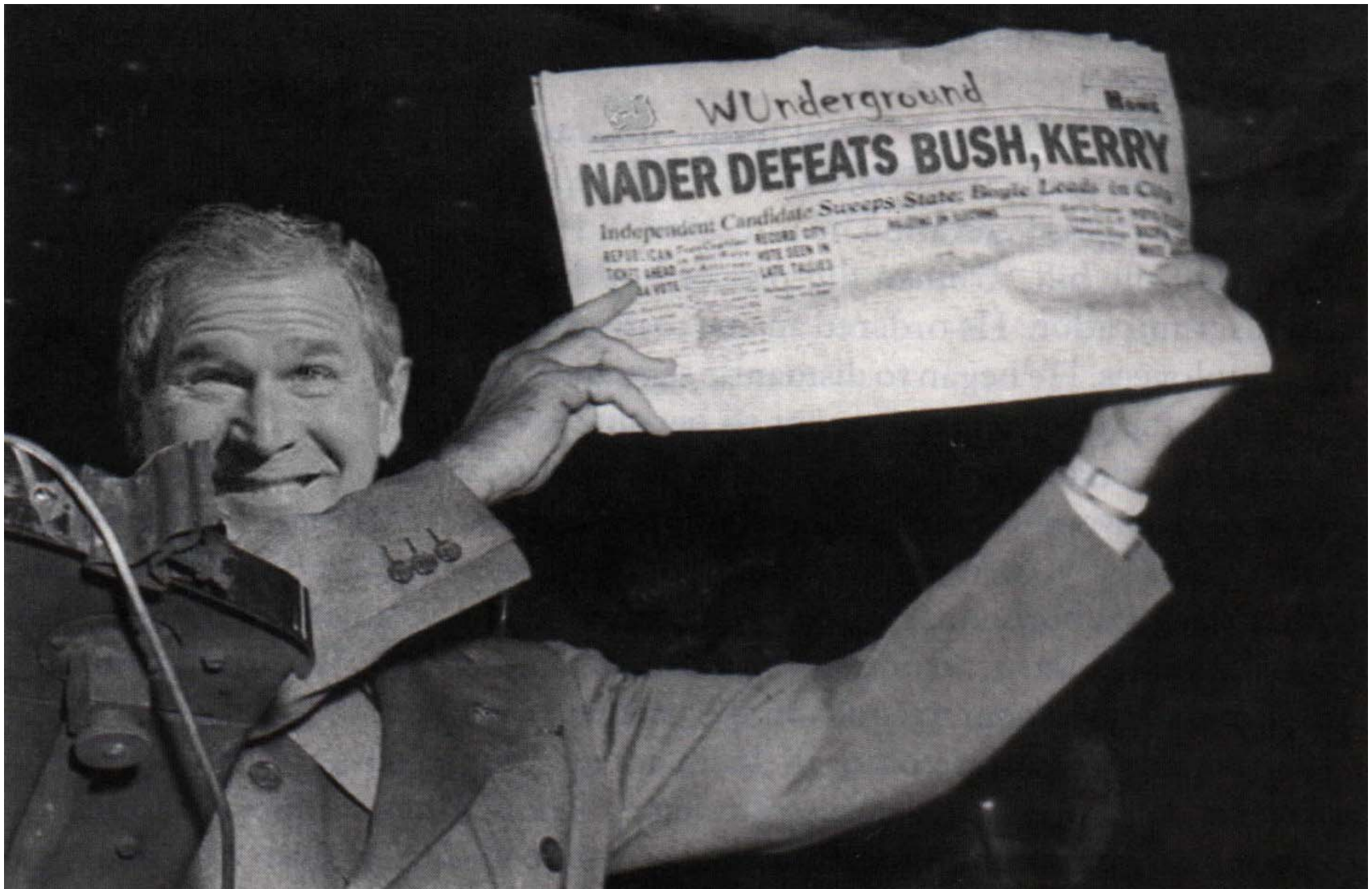

Anchor splash, DG's annual philanthropic fundraiser, is held each year in Millbrook pool and consists of a series of swimming relays capped off by a

Irate wolf topples Danforth

In a related event, the Student Activities office has said that they will begin to investigate Wydown Water for allegations that the South 40 store has sold water to minors.

Japanese engineering students develop cheaper, more efficient lunch



Japanese students in the school of Engineering and Applied Science announced yesterday that they have developed a cheaper, better, and more reliable version of the popular EnCouncil product, Cheap Lunch.

"Because of Japanese innovation and cheap labor, we are able to provide lunch to the American consumer for less," said Hideo Takashi, one of the head engineers on the project.

Critics have spent this fall waiting for the highly anticipated arrival of Cheaper Lunch, saying that it

promises Americans a meal that doesn't guzzle money, and isn't too large and unwieldy. Traditionally, the American lunch market has been dominated by domestic producers, but in recent years Japanese lunches have started making headway.

Cheap Lunch is also attempting to stay competitive through the introduction of a new ad campaign, which markets Cheap Lunch as embodying the American persona: "a full meal that's tough, hardy, and prepared with pride."

Cheap Lunch and Cheaper Lunch are held every Wednesday from 11:00-1:00 in Lopata Gallery.

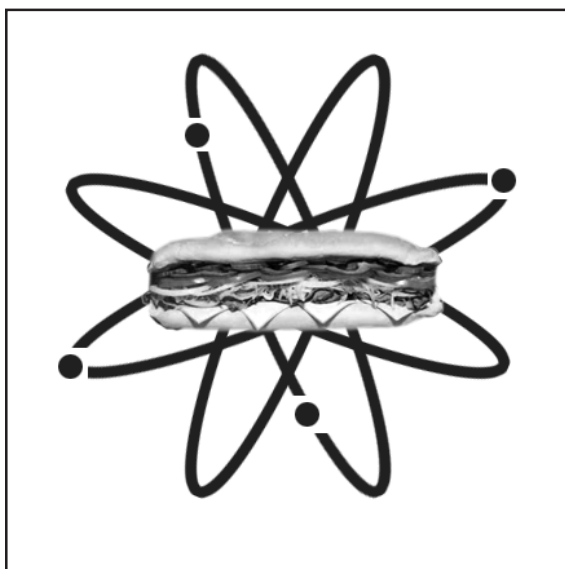
Subway line reaches quantum speeds

It's a typical Wednesday afternoon on the hilltop campus, and students have gathered at Subway to grab a bite to eat before heading back to their dormitories or to another class. The food court at Mallinckrodt has already closed, leaving Subway with an overflow of demand. A student shuffles down the steps leading into 'The Rat,' and gets behind the last person in line. And then, just like that, she begins to blink in and out of three dimensional space.

This is not a new phenomenon. In 1924, Louis de Broglie predicted that all matter behaves as waves with a minimum uncertainty in position and momentum. However, a particle's wave nature could only be visible for very small particles or very slow moving particles. For an average sized human to exhibit quantum properties, they must travel less than 1.57×10^{-17} meters per year, speeds previously

unattainable in a laboratory.

But not in our Subway. The students trapped inside this food line roughly approximate the



famous 'electron in a box,' in which a particle takes on quantum properties by being placed inside a box with the same dimensions as its wave length.

"I came here to get a tuna on

wheat on my way to math class," said sophomore Michelle Tees, her voice echoing from some unexplainable region beyond human understanding, "but I've moved less than 10^{-30} feet in almost an hour. I hope I'm not late to class."

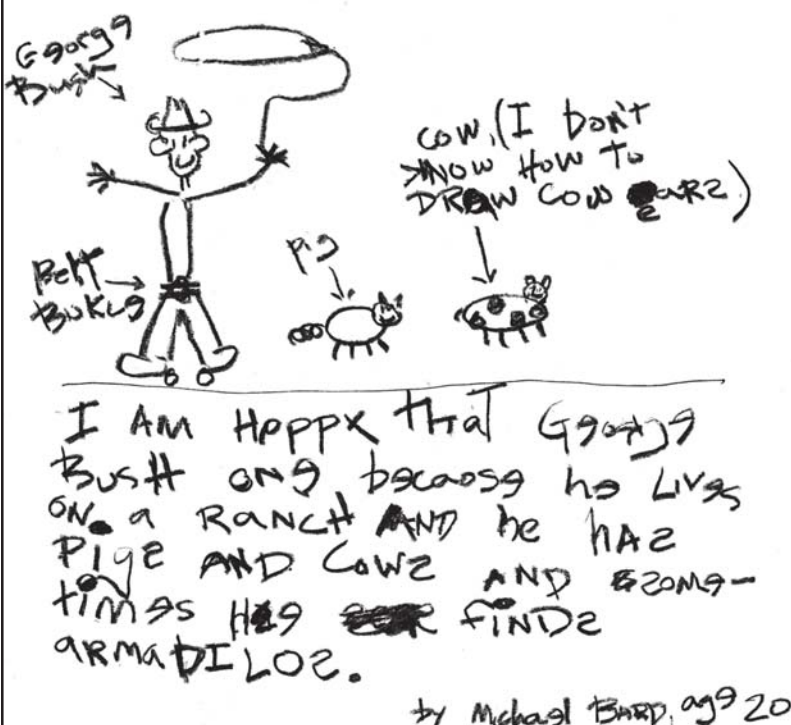
